<b>2</b>	<b>Learning Outcomes / Skills</b> Students will be enabled to answer questions of international economic policy by means of the economic theory (in particular micro- and macro-economics). The focus topics “Globalisation” and “European Integration” will be dealt with by means of case studies on individual political measures and decisions. Apart from basic issues of international trade, current topics (e. g. TTIP) will be discussed. Students will thus learn to assess the significance of international interrelations of business and society in Germany and Europe. They will additionally develop a better understanding for other cultures, the necessity for international collaboration and the role of international organisations (World Bank, IWF, EU, G8 etc.). In order to create an international environment appropriate to the contents, the lecture will be held in English.
